Mount Allison University boasts brilliant biologists

Nine biology students at Mount Allison University recently shared over \$10,000 in endowed prizes, recognizing their strong academic, laboratory, and research performance.

The students, from across Canada, are excelling in their studies of biology at the first, second, third and fourth-year levels.

These awards are funded from endowed gifts from generous donors to recognize excellence in biology.

This year's recipients include: Mary McQuaid of Summerside, P.E.I., Beth MacDonald of Stelarton, N.S., and Tania Nguyen of Bathurst, N.B., who each received the Flemington Scholarship, valued at \$2,500. The Flemington Scholarship is awarded to students entering third year, with outstanding records who have indicated

some interest and skill in field work and/or laboratory work.

Nicole Templeman of Heffley Creek, B.C. received the Harold Chapman Steeves and Annalea Steeves Memorial Prize, valued at \$1,750. The award is given to an outstanding student majoring or honouring in biology.

Elisabeth Wallace of Cumberland Bay, N.B. and Anne Aubut of Halifax, N.S. were the recipients of the Ruggles Gates Prize, valued at \$250 and awarded to students whose academic standing is high and who show promise or the ability to do original research. This award is normally given to a fourth-year student who is working on an honours thesis.

Katrina De Zeeuw, of Mount Pearl, Nfld. received the Weeks Prize, valued at \$100 and given to the student achieving the highest standing in Biology

Celia Robichaud of Moncton was awarded the BioMed Society Award, valued at \$100, and given to a student who achieves high standing in certain second-year biology courses and shows outstanding promise as a biologist.

Lia Cerasani of Winnipeg, Man., received the Lady Banting Prize. The award, valued at \$100, is given to a student who achieves high standing in certain second-year biology courses and shows outstanding promise as a biologist.
